

Ensuring public safety for certain plant and machinery

Sometimes the use of certain equipment in non-workplaces may put the public at risk. For example, domestic lifts in residential apartment buildings, amusement rides at school fetes and tractors on hobby farms.

The community has a right to expect that equipment in a public space is installed, maintained and operated safely. Since 1994, the *Equipment Public Safety Act* 1994 has set out obligations on the designers, manufacturers, suppliers, owners and operators involved with this equipment.

This Act is currently supported by two regulations: the *Equipment (Public Safety) (General) Regulations 1995* and the *Equipment (Public Safety) (Incident Notification) Regulations 1997.*

Both of these regulations have been consolidated into one as part of the broader move to streamline all of Victoria's safety regulations and remove duplication.

Aside from a reduction in red tape with a new emphasis on enabling duty holders to focus their efforts on controlling rather than assessing risks, the regulation generally does not impose any significant changes to existing obligations.
